MEMBERS' WEARING OF REGALIA

INSIGNIA OF THE ORDER

The badge of the insignia of the Order has an eight pointed white enameled cross. Between each arm of the cross is a gold two headed eagle and the Arms of the Order, which is a white cross on a red oval shield.

The cross is surmounted with a gold crown and attached by a link ring to a gold trophy bearing the Arms of the Order. The insignia is suspended from a neckribbon.

MANTLE OF THE ORDER

The mantle of the Order is a full-length red robe, vertically edged with white satin and with a white satin collar. The mantle is fully lined with white satin.

An eight-pointed Maltese cross also in white satin is on the left side of the mantle.





ELEVATION TO HIGHER RANK

Recommendation for elevation to higher rank shall only be made because of meritorious conduct and exemplary service to the Order over a period of at least two years. Elevation of rank is not an automatic process and constitutes recognition of merit based on the work or deeds of the individual.

GRAND PRIORY OF AUSTRALASIA ITEMS

LAPEL BADGE

TIE

The lapel badge of the Order is an 15mm enameled red badge with the eight-pointed white Maltese Cross edged in gold and surmounted with a gold crown.

The official tie of the Order is navy blue having a pattern of a white cross on a red shield and the eight-pointed white Maltese Cross.



SCARF

The scarf of the Order is a rectangular navy blue scarf having a pattern of a white cross on a red shield and the eight pointed white Maltese Cross.



BOW TIE

The bow tie of the Order is navy blue having a pattern of a white cross on a red shield and the eight-pointed white Maltese Cross.



IMPORTANT: The bow tie **only, must** be worn when wearing the mantle and collarette or, wearing collarette without the mantle.

For Knights: Insignia must be worn with an OSJ bow tie. The neck ribbon is placed under the shirt collar.



Knight/Dame of HonourMantle collar with no braid.




Knight/Dame of Grace KGSJ/DGSJ




Knight/Dame Commander of GraceMantle collar with two silver braid.




Knight/Dame of Justice KJSJ/DJSJ

Bailiff/Grand Dame Grand Cross of Justice OSJ

Breast Star of the Order

Worn on the left side of the coat by Knight/Dame Commander of Justice, Knight/Dame Grand Cross of Justice and Bailiff/Grand Dame Grand Cross of Justice. The Star is worn on a formal occasion.

Sash of the Order

Knight/Grand Dame Grand Cross of Justice and Bailiff/Grand Dame Grand Cross of Justice wear the Sash of the Order (with the badge of the Order on the lower edge) over the right shoulder to the left hip and under the jacket. The Sash is worn on a formal occasion.






LEADERS OF THE ORDER

For Knights: The Insignia MUST be worn with only the OSJ bow tie. The neck ribbon is to be worn under the shirt collar.

Commander of Commandery


Braid of rank and one silver bar (50 mm long) at each front edge of the collar if K/D of Grace or one gold bar at each front edge of the collar

if K/D of Justice.



Prior of Priory

Braid of rank and two gold bars each 50 mm long at each front edge of the collar.



Grand Prior of Grand Priory

Braid of rank and three gold bars each 50 mm long at each front edge of the collar.





Diagram summarizing rank placement. Braid width: 13mm. (Indicative only: not to scale)

First Braid: Silver or Gold braid is to be measured 38mm from the collar neck seam to the inner edge of the braid and finishing 76mm from the front edge of the collar.

Second Braid: Silver or Gold braid is to be measured 114mm from the collar neck seam to the inner edge of the braid and finishing 76mm from the front edge of the collar.

Third Braid: Only Gold, and the braid is to be equidistant between the first two and finishing 76mm from the front edge of the collar.



Clergy Sash (Stole)



The stole is a symbol of priestly / ministerial office. It is worn by the officiating Prelate or Priory Chaplain at all religious services of the Order and when administering the oath during an investiture.

The *Medals of Merit*, namely those of Gold, Silver and Bronze, are awarded at the discretion of the Grand Prior/Prior and hence are not mandatory. The decision to grant these awards rest exclusively with the Petit Conseil. All three medals hang from a red and white ribbon. As with all other insignia, Dames may wear their badges or medals from a bow.

Medals of Merit will immediately follow that of the Order. When worn by a Dame and if this is her only award, the insignia of merit may hang from a ribbon mounted on a bow.

The Cross of Merit may be presented as a special reward from the LT Grand Master to those members who have given extensive and special services to the Order or to the communities that it serves whether over a period of years or as a special act deriving such recognition. The decision to grant such an award rest exclusively with the LT Grand Master.



Miniatures and Ribbons.

When you receive the Insignia of the Order you also receive a Miniature of the Order.

The Miniature is only worn with evening wear, on the right breast, it is not worn with day wear.

When mounted, the total length is not to exceed 50 mm unless other insignia so necessitate.

Wearing of Medals

The Official "Order of Wearing Australian Honours and Awards" document states that only awards of the Most Venerable Order of the Hospital of St John of Jerusalem may be worn with other Australian Honours and Awards.

Order of Saint John of Jerusalem, Knights Hospitaller awards may be worn on the right side of the body, **but under no circumstances** should they be mixed with authorised awards.

Only insignia of the Most Venerable Order of the Hospital of St John of Jerusalem may be worn on ADF uniform.

It is recommended that the Neck Insignia is only worn at purely OSJ activities / functions not at unrelated functions.

Under no circumstances does the right to wear these Medals or their ribbons devolve to a family member or relative other than for family members of a deceased recipient.
